

ACT vs. SAT

All students planning to apply to four-year colleges and universities are strongly encouraged to take the SAT and ACT during their junior year. Both of these tests are accepted as measures of college readiness at virtually all of the colleges and universities in the country. Many students wonder which test is best so below we outline some of the differences between the two tests, as well as some things to consider when choosing which test to take.

- Check to see if the school(s) you plan to apply to have a preferred test
- Most students perform about the same on both tests

Typically, juniors should take their college entrance tests near the end of the semester in which they take math their junior year. Most all four-year college bound juniors should take one of the tests in May or June of their junior year and again in the early fall of their senior year. Many who take math in the fall of the junior year are also encouraged to take the SAT in December or January. Counselors meet with juniors individually to make specific recommendations for each student.
